Steam Section Meeting notes 19th Feb 2013

8 members and one guest present for a very pleasant evening enjoyed in fellowship and conversation.

Our guest was Roger, who usually models 1/64 scale but is interested in making 7 1/4" locos, preferably NZR. Discussion on plans,

relative sizes of NZR locos in this gauge, and in getting started. Some avenues of investigation suggested.

Discussion on MEANZ and the recent OMES proposal to hold more regular meetings - two years between meetings at Expo is too long an interval and recent events indicate that better communication is required to keep abreast of developments.

Bill Ward had brought along his completed boiler for Juliette ready for testing and certification. Rest of loco progressing nicely.

Ken McIntyre mentioned that turbine powered steam locos dated back around 1924 and were not a new idea. He was talking about progress on his experimental steam turbine powered loco and was awaiting delivery of the boiler following repair.

He had made a successful power feed for his drill mill and was very satisfied with the result.

Boating Section Report

Well the weather has settled down and we've had some good days on the pond. Heritage Day was very well attended by the public and the pond was quite busy all day. There was some form of action going all the time keeping the interest of the public, thanks to all members who helped. I can't believe the ways the kids find to abuse the pond yachts. Thanks to Tui Vercoe who manned the yacht hirage for a while so I could have a play on the pond.

I had hoped to have the wee Huntsman running on Heritage day but it kept blowing fuses, (at least they were doing their job this time). I ran a meter over it and found that while it was drawing 2 amps on the bench it was drawing 8 amps in the water; I was using 7.5 amp fuses, so I'm on the hunt now for a 2 blade 35mm prop with less pitch. I will keep you posted.

I think we need a wee reminder of Pond courtesy. Now while you know you have a 2.4g radio, other Boaties may not so it can be unnerving for them when you throw your boat in the water and start playing. So just go say hi to the others and say what system your running and ease their mind. On the other side, if there is clash of frequency and you don't tell anyone then how would they know you are waiting to have some time on the water. Go say hi to everyone and say you are waiting, that way we all get some pond time.

We have a new member, Keith Brown. He has moved here from Christchurch so make him welcome at the pond. He has a few boats, one being a rather large and good looking Brave Borderer.

I will be ordering a few things from HobbyKing in the near future, I have one member who wants something so if you need anything let me know and I can include it in the order with one posting.

While chatting with other Boaties at the pond it became apparent that there are members who have odd bits and pieces that may be just what you are looking for. Either let it be known around the pond or let me know if you need anything and we can circulate it and you never know what may turn up.

We will need to clean the pond soon, there are some leaks in it and we are looking at the best way to seal these. The boating section is responsible for the pond area; that is grass cutting, weed spraying, pond cleaning and maintenance and general tidiness. Please do your bit to help when it's needed.

The AGM is coming up so please be there if you can. It's not a stressful night and it's a good opportunity to catch up with other club members.

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Flying Section Report

Remember the MAMS AGM is the 9th April at the clubrooms, 7:30pm.

I would like to welcome a new member, Jason Gazzard, to the Flying section, he is an experienced flyer and I hope he will enjoy flying with us. There are a few more people interested in joining and I have given out a few membership application forms recently. MFNZ subs are now due for the 2013/2014 year, Junior membership is unchanged from last year at \$20, Senior membership has gone up to \$67 and Family membership is \$72. If MFNZ members could pay these to MAMS by the end of May it will allow me to pay MFNZ before the end of June for unbroken membership and insurance cover. Flying activities have been continuing as normal, there have not been large numbers at the field but members are usually getting out flying both days during the weekend and I hear a few are getting out regularly during the week. For those of you that mix their own glow fuel Ron tells me he can buy 20 litre cans of Methanol from Hobby Central in Richmond for \$90 delivered, which he says is cheaper than locally. He also says he has bought covering film from HobbyKing and is pretty happy with the quality and price, others have also mentioned it is fairly good.

Allan mentions in his report that our flying site at Tuamarina will be designated a danger zone by CAA as of the end of May, I will give full details on the in the June newsletter. It will allow us to legally fly up to 1000 feet after in comes into force, we will still have to keep well clear of any full size aircraft in the area and fly safely, but for now nothing has changed.

Slope soaring has been a bit disappointing this season, only one more session to go, the weather has not been the best with very light lift on most occasions this year. Numbers attending have also been down on last year, Wednesday 3rd will be last organised session for this season, recommencing again when daylight saving starts again in spring.

Indoor flying was continued into the summer but numbers got so low it was not worth continuing and the last couple off sessions were cancelled. With daylight saving finishing next weekend we will look at having indoor flying through the winter on the first Sunday each month as before, meet at the car park outside Woodbourne main gate at 6:45pm.

Safe flying is no accident.

Allan's report for March.

March has seen quite a bit of NDC flying as the results show. Sadly it has been mostly just me but Al Baker chipped in with IC Vintage duration flying a beautiful John Ensoll built Lancer 72. It is early days for Al but the model is going better and better and I'm confident it will be very competitive in IC duration.

Turning on to finals.

We flew the new Altitude limited electric sailplane class N too this month. Pete Deacon and I both have the nifty little altitude switches that cut the engine at a predetermined height and/or time from launch. Class N is called ALES 200 (Meters)

And you need 10 minutes flying from this height. Pete had trouble with his model but my little V Tail Apex did the job really well and I have claimed a new NZ record for my score of 2557 points out of a possible 2600. These new ALES classes are proving popular around the country. They provide similar challenges to the winch launch glider classes but are easier to use because you don't need a winch. I flew Electric Vintage duration too with Scram. It needs lift to make the 5 minute flight time but the air was so good on the day it was easy. I couldn't land it accurately though so scores suffered.



Scram and Apex both went great on the day in the good air.

I have started a big glider for Aero Tow. It will be a 5m SHK. There is a build log on RC groups. It uses lots of techniques new to me so has plenty of challenges like rolling the fuselage on a giant tapered mandrel. Really good fun and it will be an impressive model. I've done my best to make it an efficient design by using the latest in aerodynamics from the thermal soaring world. Glass fuse and carbon wing. The v Tail is carbon reinforced veneer over foam with open bays cut out.

The real SHK. I hope to have the drogue chute on the model too.

Finally some good news about our flying patch. It will be officially an Aeronautical Danger Zone on aeronautical charts late May. This will give us 1000 foot clearance over the field but will not relieve us of the responsibility to get out of the way of full size aircraft. They just shouldn't stray into our area. Carl will be telling us some more about this.

We have stuff to look forward to coming up.
