Committee Meeting notes for December 2023 / January 2024

We hope you and your families have had an enjoyable holiday time and are refreshed and ready for whatever the year ahead brings.

This year's Heritage Day (Waitangi Day) is on Tuesday 6th Feb and has occupied our thoughts and planning. A letter containing details for the weekend was sent to members as well as to Nelson and Christchurch clubs. The intention is for members and visitors to be able to use the track facilities at their leisure over the weekend, apart from Sunday afternoon which is a scheduled monthly running

day, and also on Monday, then Tuesday will be for Public Heritage Day activities.

Unfortunately the track upgrade project is not complete so we can only use the ground level track system for carrying passengers. The raised track will be able to be used in a limited way for personal and club loco use only, but not on Heritage Day.

The usual activities will take place with model boat and yacht sailing on the pond and with a static display of models in the Clubrooms. We will be without ladies to help in the kitchen over the weekend so your patience and co-operation will be appreciated. Donations of biscuits, loaves, etc toward morning/afternoon teas would be appreciated, please, and can be left in the kitchen.

There will be a light pot-luck meal on Tuesday evening for members, visitors and guests to round off the activities of a busy day. 5.30pm – 6pm. Members please bring salad and a dessert. Sausages will be provided for the barbecue. BYO but soft drinks will be provided. These meals have been a great time together in past years and you are cordially invited to join us.

The annual model of the year meeting was held on Tuesday 12th December at 7.30pm in the clubrooms and was an enjoyable opportunity to get together for a social time of fellowship and to see what models and projects have been worked on during the year. Slope Soaring Temporary Suspension

Most MAMs pilots are probably now aware that the Wither Hills Farm Park has been temporarily closed to the public due to the on-going extreme fire risk. After discussion with the Meadowbank Station landowner it was decided MAMs should temporarily suspend flying activities at our slope soaring site at Meadowbank, as the consequences of a model crashing and a battery fire starting in the tinder dry conditions could be devastating for the landowner, the local community and the club. As soon as it is safe to recommence slope soaring an email update will be circulated.

Model Flying NZ News

- 1. MFNZ Membership Fees for 2024/25 for senior members these remain unchanged from last year at \$95, however junior membership is now FREE and 'juniors' are considered as anyone under the age of 26. This is a significant change and will hopefully help to attract more young members. Fees must be paid into the MAMS bank account by or before 31st March for members to remain 'financial' and to retain their MFNZ insurance cover needed to fly at club sites. The MAMS club subscription of \$60 can also be paid at the same time as the MAMS fee and must be paid by or before 31st July.

Aerotowing Events – Nelson Lakes February 23-26 & Marlborough April 26-29

Several scale aerotow/soaring events are held around New Zealand each year for those who enjoy flying scale sailplanes and towplanes or 'tugs'. Models range in size from around 2 metres up to 6, 7 or even 8 metre behemoths and these are quite impressive to see both on the ground and while airborne. Two aerotow/soaring events will be happening in our region over the coming months – one at the Nelson Gliding Club's field at Lake Station from 23rd-26th February and the other at Quaildale Station in the Waihopai Valley from 26th-29th April.

Visit to Nelson Club

I was lucky enough to visit the Nelson Model Aero Club flying site at Whakapuaka recently – see photos below. The main reason for the visit was so that my friend Sam Laidlaw and I could refresh our aerotowing skills in preparation for the forthcoming events. Aerotow is an unusual type of RC flying discipline as 2 aircraft are connected by a towline which means the pilots must co-ordinate control inputs closely and communicate their intentions clearly to ensure a successful tow and release. The skills really need to be practiced regularly to stay proficient and it is easy to get rusty if you don't fly often enough. Although we were both quite rusty at the start we had a great time and by the end of the day the take-offs, tows and landings had greatly improved. If you ever have time the Nelson flying field is worth a visit. The runway is very long with a smooth, firm surface and few obstacles. You will need to contact a NMAC member in advance to gain access as the entrance is padlocked.

The Soaring Scene

Here we are starting a new competition year and it seems no time since the 2023 season finished. Last year was another good year for MAMS in the National Decentralised Competitions (NDC) where our small but enthusiastic group of glider flyers continue to make our presence felt nationally.

In the NDC Soaring category MAMS finished second, close behind the Christchurch club. With 10 clubs featuring, Christchurch had 745 points, we had 716 and North Shore were third with just 72, which gives you some idea of the dominance of South Island clubs in this competition. Individually Rex Ashwell was 2nd, Phil Elvy 3rd, Carl McMillan 6th, Garry Morgan 7th, Phil Sparrow 12th, Peter Deacon 13th, Peter Smith 14th, Chris Hagen 15th and Philip Gibbison 20th.

We did well in the Overall competition too, despite only flying Soaring events while some clubs competed in several of the five categories available - Vintage, Free Flight, Control Line, Soaring and Pylon. MAMS were second, again behind Christchurch but ahead of 25 other clubs from all parts of the country. Individually Rex Ashwell took 2nd, Phil Elvy 4th, Carl McMillan 7th, Garry Morgan 8th and so on down to Philip Gibbison in 47th place. Philip didn't join us until halfway through the season so 47th is a good result in a field of 123 competitors. Once again something for the club to be proud of.

Weather is a major factor in soaring competition and much of January has been ideal for kite flying, so not exactly what we are looking for. In fact there have been very few suitable days at Tuamarina so far. We don't fly competitions on the club strip on Sundays, leaving the power flyers to do their thing without having to worry about where the silent, slow moving obstructions that we fly are. Fortunately we often have

Quaildale farm in the Waihopai Valley as an alternative and we have had a couple of excellent Sundays out there this month - lots of thermals and quite good scores. It was particularly hot competition in Radian with only 5 seconds covering the first three places:

It was close in ALES 200 as well - Phil Elvy and Peter Deacon are away to a good start this season. For those not familiar with the formats of these events, in Radian the aim is a 7 minute flight and a measured spot landing, while 200 has a 10 minute flight and spot landing. Both have launch altitude limits of 200 meters, the main difference being the use of 2 metre foam Radian models in the first, while anything goes up to a 4 metre wingspan in ALES 200.
